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MSU PROVIDES RESEARCH ASSETS TO COURT CASE

THE MSU A-CAPP CENTER FILES AMICUS BRIEF WITH SECOND CIRCUIT

EAST LANSING, MI — The Center for Anti-Counterfeiting and Product Protection, or the A-CAPP Center, at Michigan State University filed an amicus brief on Friday in the Second Circuit Court of Appeals in New York providing information and research on the effects of trademark counterfeiting and the importance of cutting off financial assets to counterfeiters in the *Nike v. Wu* case.

The amicus brief is a legal document filed in a court case by non-litigants that posess a strong interest in the subject matter—for the A-CAPP Center the issue was about online counterfeiting and the proceeds of that activity. The decision of whether to consider an amicus brief lies in the hands of the court and it is used as supplemental information in making the end decision.

The case *Nike v. Wu* confronts the issues of online trademark counterfeiting of Nike and Converse products, and the protection of those trademarks from counterfeiting under the Lanham Act. The brief was also joined by the <u>American Apparel and Footwear Association</u>.
